CVB Executive Director Marz Akapito, with assistance from Kampetson KD Olap and Repienifou JP Akapito did the chant and carrying of the sepi in front of a crowd at Commons B which housed the FSM booth.

It is the general conviction of our tourism network in FSM that participating at the World Expo in Osaka, which is a six months long global event, will boost our marketing efforts and elevate interest in our islands.

4TH FSM EXPO TAKES PLACE IN YAP

The fourth year of holding the premier culture and trade exposition in the FSM brought together representatives, spectators, organizers, business folks, and leaders from the FSM National Government, the State of Kosrae, the State of Chuuk, and the host State of Yap. Pohnpei State was unable to make it to Yap. However, they held their own version of the Expo remotely from home turf.

The Micronesia Expo has been a platform for exchange of ideas amongst the states and the FSM governments through the FSM Tourism Division at the Department of Resources and Development, which is the focal point office for the nationwide event.

Likewise, the event has also been a catalyst for culture revival and sharing, utilizing the support of elders in areas of food preparation, natural resource stewardship, carving of valuable traditional crafts and tools, dances, chants, storytelling, and traditional attire.

Additionally, business operators and sellers of popular Micronesian food, household items, and fashion materials take advantage of this growing event. Because it alternates among the state, it provides equal opportunities for sellers to promote and sale products at home and at the other sister states.

The Expo event has also ushered in the evolution of the FSM greeting of KAMORALE, which is composed of the four main state greeting words of Kaselelie (Pohnpei), Mogethin(Yap), Raan Annim (Chuuk), and Lenwo (Kosreai). The FSM National Government has urged all citizens to practice using KAMORALE at official functions and when greeting each other in the FSM.

The Micronesia Expo has gone to all the states once. There has been no guarantee it will keep on happening.
