### NATIONAL GEOGRAPHIC RESOLUTION IGNITES POSSIBILITIES, BIG LESSONS FOR CHUUK



Around 6:00am on October 20, the Lindblad Expedition National Geographic Resolution cruise ship entered the Chuuk Lagoon Northeast Pass, ending a long period of waiting for this industry to reappear.

The Resolution made its way to Chuuk from Guam, stopping at Magur Island in the Nomunweito subregion for a few hours of snorkeling about 24-hours prior to arriving Chuuk Lagoon.

With capacity for one hundred thirty eight adventurers, the ship is a "culmination of luxury and adventure".

On this trip, around twenty six guests and twelve crew members were prepared to snorkel, visits landmarks and sites, and bird-watch.

CVB was responsible for organizing the land-based activities. The Blue Lagoon Dive Shop took care of the snorkel and sea-based events.

At present, there are no land-tour operators in Chuuk. The hotels used to do this for their divers, but, as the roads got really bad in the late 90's, land tours logistics became increasingly unsustainable. This fact crippled the industry and forced a condition of neglect at most sites.

More recently, there has been some indication of interest in revisiting war relic sites and a curiosity for historic sites. However, operating tour activities lacks human and technical resources. At present, the CVB has been trying to fill the gaps while encouraging a return to the "trade" as part of hotel management.

Tentative schedules and inquiries have been made for incoming cruise ships at the end of November and a sizable one possible in March, 2024. Learning from our experience with the Resolution, Chuuk needs a more capable planning team to ably prepare and avail quality receptions on dock, and better transport coordination and time management to maximize visitors' interaction.

The resort's official dedication and opening celebration took place on the 6th of October, just in time for the general assembly of the Association of Pacific Island Legislature that brought legislators and esteem guests to Chuuk, some of whom lodged at the resort.

There is broad official and community appreciation expressed toward the BJ and Leilani Mori family for their efforts and commitment to business investment over the past twenty years.



### CVB AND SAPUK COMMUNITY EMBARK ON LIGHTHOUSE ENHANCEMENT

We intend to keep up with cleaning once a week until the end of the year. CVB and Owners will devise a management plan to guide community-led activities in keeping the site attractive and accessible.

On October 23, Mr. Aka Cholymay, along with two others, represented family owners of the area where the Japanese Lighthouse is located at a meeting with Chuuk Visitors Bureau. At this meeting, owners and CVB established the understanding that a joint effort must be done in improving conditions for the lighthouse as a favorite visitor's attraction in Chuuk.

CVB officials used the recent experience with visitors from the National Geographic Resolution who visited the site on October 20th as a basis for discussion. One of the visitors got injured after she fell on the way down from the lighthouse.

As part of the understanding, CVB will help procure working tools to make easier access; cement part of the road where it is most slippery; and hire a part-time staff as part of a forming community-based management.
